President's Note





STANDARD EPISODE THREE ? "AMATURE UPHOLSTERY"

As those of you know who read my nonsense of the previous two Stand-

ard articles, if I am anything I follow the birds! That is, like the birds, I am frequently heard chirping CHEAP.CHEAP,CHEAP! The birds make music, I save money. My upholstery skills are not keeping any reputable upholsterers awake at night. I do think that to learn something and get better at it you have to be willing to make mistakes. To that end I let a few moths out of the wallet to purchase mate-



rials and have a go at the Standards' panels and seats.



The panels on the doors and rear areas were thin plywood. In the proper British tradition, the panels that were on the car had been host to several insect species. I was able to hold them together just long enough trace around them for new panels made from one quarter Baltic Birch and dismantle the fabric for clues on how they were put together. I do have skills in spraying glue! Fortunately, the panels involve a lot of gluing. The rear panels involved no sewing just spray, pray and glue! Not too bad. The door panels have two smaller panels that have tuck and roll and a pocket. Dusting off my vintage 1929 Singer commercial sewing machine, I embarked on the trials of pleating. I have found two different ways to do tuck and roll (there are probably more) you can



put the fabric over the padding and sew straight through or you can layout the pleats then fold the fabric back on itself and sew through the edge that is presented. The first is pretty straight forward and shows the stitching. The second hides the stitching. Apparently, this gives a directional bias to the tuck and roll that favors one direction over the other as you



slide across the seat upon entry. Must confer to the gods of upholstery more on that one. The Standard, of course uses the second harder one. The vintage Singer and its vintage operator managed to get the small area of pleats and the pockets completed to an acceptable level for Sadie the dog. Time for more trials. With my basic introduction to tuck and roll why not try the rear seat? It is only exponential-

ly larger and more complex. Approximately 32 pleats across and over thirty inches long, what could go wrong?

A lot. I laid out the pleats, no biggy A long sew line takes a lot of thread! Bobbins are vile things! They wait until the least opportune moment to run out. They often fall out of the machine just after you think you put them in correctly. To put new thread on the things you have to unthread the machine, thread the bobbin on the bobbin rewinder and then install it in the



holder, install that in the machine properly, rethread the machine (a chal-



lenge for old eyes) and move on without losing your place on the work. I have great respect for my wife the quilter! But I digress, I managed to get the pleats all sewn in a couple of days. I was proud! As the saying goes, it comes before a fall! Upon inspection I found that I had threaded the machine improperly a couple of times and several of sewn lines did not have tight stitches. I am now pretty good at removing

stitches! I did it over! GOOD NEWS! I did get the rear seat done to Sadie's satisfaction. It will look better the more she sheds. Perhaps I can get her to shed on the front seats once I start them!

Would love to hear about some of the other projects out there!
